KEY ASPECTS OF MUTUAL RELATIONS IN INTERDISCIPLINARY COOPERATION

Qualitative interview study

Purpose

To describe how specialists experience mutual relations in interdisciplinary cooperation at a highly specialized neurorehabilitation hospital. Since 1997 the treatment of patients has been organised and perperformed by



Methods

To The empirical study comprises of two focus group interviews and three individual interviews with participants in interdisciplinary cooperation; physio- and occupational therapists, nurses and assistants.

The data is analysed phenomenologically, using key concepts from systems theory, Wenger's social theory of learning and Wackerhausen's theory on the formation of professionalism.

Highlights



The professionals experience mutual understanding and that interdisciplinary cooperation is useful

- Knowledge sharing is key to success both formal and informal sparring and communication. Knowledge sharing stabilises the social system and facilitate mutual understanding
- Important with professional and personal acquaintance between the partici-pants in order to understand each other's reality
- Different professional perspectives can be perceived as a source of disagreement, but can also be rewarding. Successful negotiation of the different perspectives depends on whether the individual professional participates peripherally or fully in the mono-disciplinary and interdisciplinary cooperation
- High degree of learning between professions, but also a special and time-consuming effort in order to be integrated in the interdisciplinary cooperation
- The organizational framework and the condition of the patient constitute a chang-ing context, which forces the professionals to continuously renegotiate mutual understanding of the situation. The organizational framework affects the other categories

Perspectives

- Professionalizing the informal sparring and communication
- Learning and focusing on central aspects in interdisciplinary cooperation by recruitment of an interdisciplinary mentor
- Interdisciplinary cooperation as a part of the formalized introduction program
- Practice learning with Interdisciplinary cooperation in focus
